Working with Communities requires planning, commitment and resources

Red Cross does this by:

- Engaging the community through a "learning by doing approach"
- > Partnering the community in assessing their own vulnerabilities and capacities VCA

Volunteers manned the hotlines and emergency call centres for ambulances

2 million pamphlets and 200 thousand posters were distributed by over 12,000 Mexican RC volunteers

- Alert RC Branches and Volunteers & provide information
- Disseminate information
- Activate RC Disaster Management Committees
- Keep the Federation informed and post to DMIS
- Establish guidelines for the safety of staff & volunteers

Belize RC launched a DREF request (unfortunately uncovered) to prepare volunteers on the border towns of Mexico and Guatemala

Grenada RC volunteers are providing surveillance support

T&T RC ambulance and staff ready to provide support to the surveillance teams at Piarco Airport



Specific Objectives:

Scale-up National Society involvement in public health activities. Increased participation in putting together a communication strategy to develop and disseminate informational material



PAHO supported project: Institutional Awareness

- Belize, Guyana and Jamaica
- 12 months
- 3 or more institutions per country prisons, orphanages, homes

for elderly, etc.

- awareness raising and education workshops/actions
- facilitate access to basic supplies for hygiene and cleaning
- personal protection equipment for staff/volunteers and hosted people
- coordination with health authorities and institutions to properly identify, refer

and ensure proper surveillance



- Will be supporting 16 Caribbean Red Cross National Societies for the accelerated programme of 6 months








NS PLANS OF ACTION: SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

Objectives		Expected Results
1.	Effective Country Planning	Preparedness and response plans are coordinated with partners, known to key stakeholders, revised as necessary
2.	Advocacy and communication	Material and messages are adapted and disseminated.
3.	Business Continuity Plan	A plan identifying crisis management protocol, essential staff, functions and projects and how they would continue.
4.	Training	Training of trainers for all RC branches or districts. Training volunteers as necessary and possible.
5.	Reduce Transmission	Adapt life-saving messages and train (see above).
6.	Food Security and Livelihood	Identify strategies and activities, provide guidance, protect and provide food as necessary and feasible.
7.	Care for the ill	Determine role of volunteer and health facility, plan for PPE, provide guidance on contingency care, provide training, referrals and PPEs as necessary and feasible.
